Volunteer Application	 Volunteer Application must be completed every year before you can register for a tournament
<u>Tournament Sign-up</u>	 All tournaments will be listed on this page. If you do not see a tournament listed it the tournament is either full or yet to be posted. Reach out to Lauren if you don't see what you're looking for. When registering for the tournament you will do it on a per round basis. You will select how many rounds you'd like to judge when registering for a tournament. This will make up your volunteer shift. Rounds/shifts range from one to two hours.
<u>Tournament Calendar</u>	 Tournament calendar for the 2022-23 season. Subject to change. Locations for in-person tournaments will be added as they are confirmed If a tournament will be entirely remote, the site will be listed as virtual
Background Check	 To volunteer with Chicago Debates you must have an active background check on file. You can submit your background check for Chicago Debates through this link. Chicago Debates will cover the cost of the background check.
Payment Forms	 <u>W9</u>: You must submit a W9 once per season in order to receive payment. This only needs to be sent in once a school year. <u>Optional Direct Deposit</u>: If you are over 18 and would like to receive direct deposit payment for your stipend, you will need to complete this authorization form <u>Stipend Form</u>: After a tournament is complete you will need

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	to submit this form in order to receive payments. Stipends are opt in only. You will not automatically receive payment unless you request it via this form. Any stipend not collected is considered a donation back to the organization.

Policy Core Files	 A comprehensive evidence packet the students will use to debate. As a judge you do not need to have read the core files or come in with any outside knowledge on the topic. This is included for your reference. <u>Middle School</u> <u>High School</u>
Policy Argument Limits	 Limitations on arguments and evidence students are able to use from the core files. Limits are determined by tournament are meant to help progress students through the material. Blue and Silver Conference Red and Maroon Conference Grant Park Conference Lake Michigan and Chicago River Conference
Public Forum Guide	 Guide to Public Forum debate including speech order, times, and goals of the round. Note: We do not flip for sides in our league. Pro will always speak first and Con will always speak second.
